RECTOR'S REPORT



When I started talking about setting a vision statement for St. Timothy's, I found a lot of surprising push back. The arguments usually followed along two lines of thought. The first was that vision statements are something that they do in the corporate world. Why would we take our cues from secular institutions? Shouldn't it be the other way around?

The second objection was given to be by several trusted priest friends but was echoed by parishioners as well. Their

objection was that vision statements consume a lot of effort, but once adopted they receive a lot of fanfare and are promptly filed away and forgotten about. It's a lot of work for something that ultimately doesn't matter.

I think both objections were best summed up by one of our parishioners during a prayer meeting – "We don't need more words!"

This is a sentiment I can get behind! The hope is that a vision statement will be paired with action. I pray that these aren't just words that get filed away, but that they give us a short way of answering the question, "What does it mean to be a member of St. Timothy's?"

And so, after a lot of prayer and discernment, I want to announce that we are not adopting a vision statement. What we are adopting is an action statement. We are Messengers of Christ's Love and Mercy.

This action statement encapsulates the essence of our calling as a community of faith. As followers of Jesus Christ, we are called not only to proclaim the Gospel but to embody it in our lives, becoming messengers of His boundless love and inexhaustible mercy to a world in need.

To ground our action statement in the timeless wisdom of Scripture, we turn to the words of the Apostle Paul in Titus 3, verses 4 and 5: "But when the goodness and loving kindness of God our Savior appeared, he saved us, not because of works done by us in righteousness, but according to his own mercy." There is a lot more scripture we'll be studying, but in the meantime, this is our foundation.

We're still in the realm of words and not action. I'll admit that an action statement is a made-up thing, but I hope it starts a conversation. What does it mean to be a messenger? What is Christ's love? How is it expressed? How does mercy enter the equation? How can I be a messenger of Christ's love and mercy for my family? For my church? For the world? How can I use this in my life?

The way we answer these questions should influence our actions. Archbishop Desmond Tutu said, "Do your little bit of good where you are; it's those little bits

of good put together that overwhelm the world." Our understanding of the love and mercy of Christ will influence the little bit of good that we strive to accomplish. It will frame our work and the way we minister to each other and to the world.

There are still many questions about action statements that are outstanding. We will begin this conversation during the season of Lent with a sermon series that will begin to equip us to answer them. As always, I appreciate your input and feedback. This is a journey we are on together. I am so thankful for all your contributions to the life and ministry of St. Timothy's.

Please continue to seek the guidance of the Holy Spirit, trusting that God's grace will empower us to be authentic messengers of Christ's love and mercy in every facet of our lives.

DEACON'S REPORT


I recently read an article that included the following which (I believe) helps to understand "being a deacon":

It is true that every priest, bishop, or archbishop all had to be a deacon first. But this does not make deacons a smaller, lesser order of ordained ministry. In fact, this makes the role of a deacon a foundational quality of all ordained life.

The Sacred Order of Deacons is historically and ecclesiologically called on behalf of the church and in the name of Jesus, to engage in what can only be described as front-line ministry. In contrast to priests, whose anchors are pulpit and altar, both pieces of furniture inside a church building, the ordination service for deacons mentions neither of these things.

Instead, the ordination service for deacons provides a job description that is a ministry outside the four walls of a church building. It doesn't give you furniture at all. In fact, furniture would be antithetical to a ministry on the street, in the office, at the local coffee shop, in a hospital, working among the neediest of our culture and society or even, as I have found, while shopping at Publix.

This year, I served as a Fire Chaplain ministering to Central Berkeley SC Fire



and EMS representing Christ the Servant providing light for those who too often see only darkness and despair. Within the four walls of St. Timothy's, I serve the Priest during worship service by reading the Gospel, leading prayer, bidding to confession, laying the table (altar), aiding in administering Communion (or, when called, to carry it to those kept from the table), and giving the dismissal to send the congregation back into the world.

As your Deacon, I end this St. Timothy's Deacon Report with this from 1 Corinthians 4:1 which defines my role as Deacon:

This is how one should regard us, as servants of Christ and stewards of the mysteries of God.

I visit the homebound, bringing them communion and being a presence, as well as visiting at hospitals and the local Hospice House.

My calling has evolved over the years but has always leaned towards the sick and the dying. I completed my training as an End-of-Life Doula in Dec 2022. It is a blessing to be able to walk with others on their final journeys and to help them make the best of the time they have left.

It is also a blessing to be a part of the Pastoral Care Ministry and to assist in making sure prayer requests get to the prayer team in a timely manner. We have an awesome prayer team, which has been in place for many years. We also have an Intercessory Prayer team which is available to pray for people during our weekly church services. We have been blessed to feel God's presence time and time again in response to our prayers.

Rita Conley-Pitts & Kay Travinski oversee our Card Ministry and Kay oversees our Grief Booklet Ministry. They send cards to members for many different occasions; get well, birth of a child, surgery, encouragement, sympathy, and sometimes just to stay in touch with those who are homebound. The Grief Booklets are sent to those who have lost a loved one.

My time as a Lay Chaplain has truly been a blessing. I am especially grateful for the people that make up our Church family at St. Timothy's.

PRAISE & WORSHIP TEAM LEADER'S REPORT

How It Works (song selection and more)

Planning the music for the worship service of other songs to blend the offering of is a process that begins with scripture. One of the key things that links the songs to the worship service agenda is the scripture verses that have been selected well in advance. We in the Anglican Church have the old and New Testament scriptures as well as the Psalms for the week selected for the entire year. For the upcoming week i am able to go through the scriptures and pick out several songs that are linked to the scripture we will be covering. These selections serve as an anchor for me to work around.

scripture are chosen it is time to fill the agenda with the remaining songs. This easy for me to hit vocally.

involves mixing the energy of the songs with traditional hymns and the chorus music. For those reading this that are not musically inclined here is how the "key" of the song works. Most of the songs written and performed are written in keys that are favorable for the author of the song. These selected keys rarely fit for my own vocal range so the songs almost always require it to be transposed to a key that works for the team. To address this we generally choose keys that are good for the vocalists on the worship team and also for the congregation to join along easily. The running joke on our worship team is that the key we play nearly all of our songs in is Once the first few songs relating to the the key of G or the key of D. These are the keys that are easy to play on the guitar and



Our church has been blessed with musicians that work very well together. It is hard for me to remember back to the days when I started leading St Timothy's with just a guitar and my vocals. I am excited each and every week to play with our current worship team. The "set list" usually gets sent out on Tuesday. It always seems to work out as the team pulls the songs together during the hour before the service. Even when it doesn't work out the way we want it to, it ends up being fun and forgiving. Joining me on the team mostly every week is Jim Priest on violin. Oeland Camp continues to commute from Columbia each week (when he is able) and

always gives new life to our song selections. Ed and Beth Barnes on bass and piano have rounded out the instrumental sound of the team and it is such a pleasure to have them play when they are able. The vocal team of Jen, Kay and Alexis have blossomed and when we are all there, the wall of harmony makes the music selections sound so good. Yasmin also joins us on viola when she is able to, which gives a more full string/orchestra sound when she plays with us.

MISSIONS

THE PELLONI FAMILY - CAMBODIA

Our family has been living and ministering in Cambodia serving as educators in a Christian bilingual school for middle class Cambodian families. In 2022, we felt the LORD call us towards church planting in Cambodia and away from education. In the beginning of 2023, we came to the States to begin fundraising, but before we could start we needed to find a home church that would care for our family and feed us spiritually as we did not have a stateside church to call home. We were directed to St Timothy's on three separate occasions before ever coming to South Carolina. When we walked in the door's of St Timothy's we felt a great love for our family from the members who we would come to call our church family.

During our nine months in the States fundraising, St Timothy's was the home that we desperately needed to keep us filled on our fundraising journey. Each week, we were able to come and be filled spiritually before visiting different churches and families to raise support for our mission in Cambodia. Having a stable home church to pour into us was invaluable during this season and we could not have raised the needed support without our home church!

In addition to emotional and spiritual support, St Timothy's also committed to financial partnership with our family as well as some of its members. We have started language learning and helping to get systems in place for the international



church plant with sights set on helping to foster and grow a Khmer church plant in 2024. I will also start seminary online through Trinity, School for Ministry which Reverend Luke Deman helped me to discern if this was the right seminary for me to attend. In 2024, Anna will begin gathering resources for family discipleship

that our church will make available to families as well as welcome in our fifth baby girl. We are grateful for the financial and prayerful commitment of our church family at St Timothy's.

Of course, God had all the details already worked out. The week after the conference, the Pellonis visited us for the first time.

they were looking for a home base for not just financial support, but for prayer support and spiritual friendship. We worked with them to visit churches in our diocese and continue their fundraising efforts. We were also to welcome Anthony into the long process of discernment into ordained ministry.

The Pellonis are back in their mission field in Cambodia, where the spiritual landscape is evolving. As they continue their work, our prayer is that our church will play a pivotal role in supporting our church planters. This family has worked zealously to establish new congregations, creating spaces where people can come together to worship, share their faith, and build a sense of community. God has used us to continue to help establish churches that serve as beacons of Christ's love and mercy in a region where the field is ripe for the harvest.

Another surprise we received in the last year was the arrival of Paddy and T. Both work as missionaries in the Gambia and Liberia. Their mission is to address and liberate victims from the heinous crime of child sex trafficking. Our church continues to pray for all that are committed to rescuing and rehabilitating victims of this abhorrent practice. Paddy and T have not required our financial support, but what they've asked for is actually a lot harder – our persistent prayers for this mission

and fellowship as well. In the coming year we hope to continue to deepen our relationship with them and the support for their mission.

We continue to support and pray for Roger and Joanna Griffin's work in Mexico. Roger continues to serve the Anglican Church in Mexico by providing education to local leaders, supplying for pastors in need, and ministering to companion churches. We pray for his success and are encouraged by the way that God has used him to continue to proclaim the Good News.

I'm so thankful that we've been able to let our light shine, not just in Summerville but across the globe. Together, God has allowed us to have a meaningful impact on the lives of countless individuals around the world. Looking ahead, we are hoping to strengthen our bonds of fellowship and belonging. We are praying for opportunities to visit our mission friends in the field and see how their work is proclaiming Christ's love and mercy.

This small but mighty congregation raised over \$3500. Our members had neighbors, family and friends involved and Luke cannot wait until our next Yard Sale. These funds provided gift cards for Thanksgiving and Christmas and will pay for the cost of food from the Lowcountry Food Bank until funds run out.

Bryan Hill, Campus Pastor Seacoast Cane Bay, partnered with us at Thanksgiving and provided 40 banker's boxes filled with sides for our client's Thanksgiving Meal. The Arden apartment complex also partnered with us to provide non-perishable items through the end of the year. During the month of September, the Arden gave raffle tickets to residents for grocery items donated and this was a big success.

We started an "item of the month" for food items that are in short supply at the Lowcountry Food Bank.

This way members can donate the muchneeded items. We ended the year with client count up again to approx. 40 families served and hope to grow in 2024. I am continuously humbled by the love and support of the family of St Timothy's. The volunteers who come to pack grocery bags every Friday and to load cars every Saturday. The volunteers that set up and tear down every month. You are truly the hands and feet of Jesus. God has blessed this ministry mightily.




STUDIES & CLASSES


BIBLE IN ONE YEAR
